

He comes without human help to besiege the hearts of men. What is nothingness in the world He has chosen, so as to put to shame that which is powerful. The child is unselfish, is humble, and pure of heart. O, when we come to the crib, let us bring our Saviour a childlike, repentant heart,





and pray to Him that we may be as little children; that we, as children, may walk in the purity of our hearts, that we may be humble before God and men. There is a beautiful legend which says that a boy encountered the Mother of God in the flight from Egypt and begged for the favor of carrying the Divine child in his arms. The Mother of God accorded him the privilege. When the boy came to a stream and looked into the water and saw his face he noticed that the features of the divine Child were imprinted upon his own. We also will pray [to] the divine Child, that He may imprint the spiritual features of His childish innocence and humility upon our souls, so that we may become as children. How beautiful it is to say of a Christian man: Before the world a man; before God, a child; in the eyes of the world, a man; in the constancy of his opinions of his faith, a child. A child in his love of prayer, for the child prays; in its love of humility, for the child is humble; in the love of purity, for the child shuns what is impure. GOD SEARCH FOR MAN

- By Pope John Paul II

Jesus does not... merely speak in the name of God ..., but He is God Himself speaking in His Eternal Word Made Flesh.... Christianity has its starting point in the Incarnation of the Word.

Here, it is not simply a case of man seeking God, but of God who comes in Person to speak to man of Himself and to show him the path by which He may be reached.... The Incarnate Word is thus the fulfillment of the yearning present in all the religions of mankind: this fulfillment is brought about by God Himself and transcends all human expectations. It is the mystery of grace....

In Jesus Christ God not only speaks to man but also seeks him out. The Incarnation of the Son of God attests that God goes in search of man. Jesus speaks of this search as the finding of a lost sheep....

It is a search which begins in the heart of God and culminates in the Incarnation of the Word. If God goes in search of man, created in His own image and likeness, He does so because He loves him eternally in the Word, and wishes to raise him in Christ to the dignity of an adoptive son. God therefore goes in search of man, who is His special possession in a way unlike any other creature. Man is God's possession by virtue of a choice made in love: God seeks man out, moved by His fatherly heart. Why does God seek man out? Because man has



turned away from Him, hiding th himself as Adam did among the trees of the Garden of Eden.... Going in search of man through His Son, God wishes to persuade man to abandon the paths of evil which lead him farther and farther afield. Making him abandon those paths means making man understand that he is taking the wrong path; it means overcoming the evil which is everywhere found in human history. Overcoming evil: this is the meaning of redemption....

The Son of God became man, taking a body and soul in the womb of the Virgin, precisely for this reason: to become the perfect redeeming sacrifice. The religion of the Incarnation is the religion of the world's Redemption through the sacrifice of Christ, wherein lies victory over evil, over sin, and over death itself....

Jesus Christ meets the man of every man of every age, including our own, with the same words: 'You will know the truth, and the truth will make you free'....

Jesus Christ came to provide the ultimate answer to the yearning for life and for the infinite which His Heavenly Father had poured into our hearts when He created us. At the climax of revelation, the incarnate Word [Christ] proclaims, 'I am... the Life..., and 'I came that they might have life....' Left to ourselves, we could not achieve the ends for which we have been created. Within us there is a promise which we find we are incapable of attaining. But the Son of God who came among us has given us His personal assurance.... As St. Augustine so strikingly phrased it, Christ 'wishes to create a place in which it is possible for all people to find true life.' This place is His Body and His Spirit, in which the whole [of] human life, redeemed and forgiven, is renewed and made divine." (Celebrate 2000! [Ann Arbor: Servant Publications, 1996], 21-24).

Meditation on the Incarnation

By Fr. Hans Urs von Baltbasar [Who] will step out along...[the] road that leads from God's glory to the figure of the poor Child lying in the manger?

Be not afraid; for behold, I bring you Good ab News of a great joy... This day is born the Savior,' that is, he who, as Son of God and Son of the Father, has traveled (in obedience to the Father) the path that leads away from the Father and into the darkness of the world. Behind him omnipotence and freedom; before, powerlessness, bonds and obedience. Behind him the comprehension of divine vision; before him the prospect...of death on the Cross between two criminals. Behind him the bliss of life with the Father; before him, grievous solidarity with all who do not know

> the Father, do not want to know him and deny his existence. Rejoice, then, for God himself has passed this way! The Son took with him the awareness of doing the Father's will. He took with him the unceasing prayer that the Father's will would be done on the dark earth as in the brightness of heaven. He took with him his rejoicing that the Father had hidden these things from the wise and revealed them to babes, to the simple and the poor.'I am the way,' and this way is 'the truth' for you: along this way you will find 'the life.' Along 'the way' that I am you will learn to lose your life in order to find it; you will learn to grow beyond yourself and your insincerity into a truth that is greater than you are. From a worldly point of view everything may seem very dark; your dedication may seem unproductive and a failure. But do not be afraid: you are on God's path. 'Let not your hearts be troubled: believe in God; believe also in me.' I am walking on ahead of you and blazing the trail of Christian love for you. It leads to your most inaccessible brother, the person most forsaken by God. But it is the path of divine love itself. You are on the right path. All who deny themselves in order to carry out love's commission are on the right path.

> > Miracles happen along this path. Apparently insignificant miracles, noticed by hardly anyone. The very finding of a Child wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger—is this not a miracle in itself? Then there is a miracle when a particular mission, hidden in a person's heart, really reaches its goal, bringing God's peace and joy where there were nothing but despair and resignation; when someone succeeds in striking a tiny light in the midst of an overpowering darkness. When joy irradiates a heart that no longer dared to believe in it. Now and again we ourselves are assured that the angel's word we

are trying to obey will bring us to the place where God's Word and Son is already made man. We are assured that, in spite of all the noise and nonsense, today, December 25, is Christmas just as truly as two millennia ago. Once and for all God has started out on his journey toward us, and nothing, till the world's end, will stop him from coming to us and abiding in us.

A Single Human Heart

[When] we realize that a single human heart stands on a higher scale than the whole extent of the universe...then we can begin to understand that the act by which God becomes man, that he who is the Creator, the eternal Logos, comes down to enter into human existence and unites himself with it, so that he himself is this man that this act is an event of a far greater significance [than the creation of the world]. God himself comes into the world and becomes a man. This opens up a dimension beside which the apparently immeasurable material dimensions represent a significantly lesser order of magnitude....

...It is a tremendous event, God really became man. That he did not disguise himself as man, did not just play the part for a while in history, but that he truly is man—and that finally when he stretches out his arms on the Cross, he makes himself into a wide open space into which we can enter.

If, then, this God-Man wants to make us all, as Scripture says, into his Body, to





draw us into a living corporate unity, just as, according to the Bible, man and woman become one flesh, then we can see that this is not just a matter of a single event, which happens and then is past. No, it is a breakthrough, a beginning, in which Christ wants to involve us through the Eucharist, through the sacraments, through baptism. In this sense, what happens here is something that surpasses any kind of evolution, the union of God and man, of creature and Creator.... [It is] an intervention, a personal act of love, which opens up for man, from this moment on, a new sphere and a new realm of possibility.⁹⁹ (Joseph Cardinal Ratzinger, God and the World [San Francisco: Ignatius Press, 2002], 215-219).

Pro-Life Christmas Sermon

If Matthew 25 has anything to say about our spiritual lives and how we will fare on that Last Day, our relationship with the poor, downtrodden and unfortunate of this world will be the substance of our particular judgment. "Lord,

when did we see you hungry or thirsty or away from home or naked or ill or in prison and not attend to you in your needs?" (Mt 25:44) is a question that many will ask of Him, but how many will like to hear that He was found in His "distressing disguise," as Mother Theresa put it,

on a daily basis right down the street from them, at the abortion mills?

The abortion parallel is not far-fetched for the modern exegete if we consider a few uncomfortable facts: unborn children are hungry for love when mother and father have both abandoned them and even sold them for a price...; they thirst for compassion from those who run the dirty business. "Will anyone— u anyone—help me, please help me?" is their fin silent scream from the womb.

If Christ is not identified with the unborn children as His "least brethren," then there is no one on earth that deserves that exalted title. We must never allow our people to forget that Christ was a fertilized egg before He was an embryo before He was a fetus before he was an infant and a toddler, a boy and a man. He took that unborn condition on Himself voluntarily in gorder to experience the very depths of de abasement in the humility of our human condition. In other words, He profoundly feels the plight of our unborn brothers and sisters to s



because He was once one of them, and He only wants us, His brother priests, to come to the aid of those poorest of His poor by our pastoral care for all those most in need. He wants us to make sure that the people under our care get that message too.

There's nothing wrong with a sermon about materialism at Christmas, but the people have heard that message already. Perhaps it's time to give them a message on the day of Christ's birth that they have not heard in a long, long time: let us see Christ in our unborn neighbors.

[God] became man. That is, he entered into human history, not so much to challenge it as to *enlighten* it, to *orient* it, to *save* it, by redeeming every single soul. This is the meaning of the Incarnation of the Word; this is the authentic meaning of Christmas, the feast of true joy and true hope.

Comprehending and accepting the message of Christmas means living the perennial contemporaneity of Christ. In our history as intelligent, free men and women, Jesus remains salvation for ever and for all. That is, he remains the answer to the supreme questions tormenting man and the grace for rising out of evil and living in the perspective of eternity. Bring this meaning of Christmas in your minds, in your life, in your human and Christian ideals! Man of today is bewildered by so many contrasting ideologies and shocked by so many dramatic and dolorous phenomena. He has need to know with certainty that, in spite of all, there is hope and joy, because God became man, Christ was really incarnated for us, the Savior announced by the Prophets came, and has remained with us!

We must believe in Christmas, strongly, deeply!

...[Jesus] *comes to redeem us....* He comes to reconcile us to God. As St. Augustine well emphasizes, with his usual expressiveness, 'By means of our Head we are reconciled with God, since in Him the divinity of the Only Begotten became a sharer in our mortality, so that we should be sharers in his immortality.'... Christmas is the beginning of that 'marvelous exchange' which unites us to God. It is the beginning of the Redemption.

'A child is born, a son is given us' (Is. 9:5).

My brothers and sisters! All you for whom this Nativity is the sign of hope! I invite you to such spiritual union! Let us surround the place where God was made man with a vast so extensive!—crown of hearts! Let us form a circle and court about this Virgin, who gave Him human life on the night of the Birth of God! Let us form a court about the Holy Family!

Emmanuel, You are among us! Together with us, You have condescended to the extreme consequences of that Alliance which has been concluded from the beginning with man, even though it had

been so often violated and infringed.... You are with us, Emmanuel! O truly admirable! God Almighty in the

CHILD IN OUR HEARTS

St. Bonaventure said that a person conceives Jesus in his soul when, dissatisfied with his life, prompted by holy Inspiration, and filled with holy fervor, he resolutely breaks away from his old habits and sins; he is, as it were, made spiritually fertile by the grace of the Holy Spirit, and he conceives the proposal to lead a new life. Christ has been conceived! Once the blessed Son of God has been conceived, he is born in the heart, as long as the person, after making the right discernment, seeking the right advice, and invoking God's help, immediately puts his holy proposal into practice and begins to act on what has been developing in his mind but which he disregarded for fear of failure. However, the proposal must be carried out immediately, it must bring about an outward visible change, if possible, in our way of living and in our habits. If the proposal isn't put into practice, then Jesus has been conceived but is not born.... The second feast of the Child Jesus, Christmas, will never be celebrated! It is one of the many postponements that have perhaps marked our lives and one of the main reasons why so few reach holiness.

[Let us imitate our Mother Mary.] [As Saint Augustine explained in *Sermons*, 189, 3, PL 38, 1006:][Jesus'] Mother carried him in her womb, may we carry him in our hearts; the Virgin became





pregnant with faith in Christ; she brought forth the Savior, may our souls bring forth salvation and praise. May our souls be not sterile, but fertile for God.' [Or as St. Francis of Assisi said], 'We are mothers of Christ when we carry him in our hearts and bodies through divine love and a pure and sincere conscience; we bring him forth through works which must be a shining example to others....'^m (*Letter to All the Faithful*, I, Writings, cit., 96). Whether they wish it or not, I shall do it. And should the brambles of the forests tear at me when I seek them, I shall force myself through all straights; I shall pull down all hedges. So far as the God whom I fear grants me the straying; I shall seek after those on the verge of being lost. If you do not want me to suffer, do not stray, do not become lost. (*Sermo* 46, 14-15: CCL 41, 541-542).



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
